









Bicycle and E-Bike Crashes (SMHLJ) - 9%


Standard Bike Crashes 6% (n=112)




Electric Bike Crashes 3% (n=61)









- Wearing the Right Helmet and fitting it correctly- Up to 85% reduction in serious head injury
- Safe Battery Charging to reduce risk of fire

BE SEEN-

Wear reflective clothing, reflectors and lights(Front and Back)

- Alert others when passing



SUN Bucks (Summer EBT)









Summer is the hungriest time of the year for children.

- During summer, children lose access to daily School Breakfast & School Lunch – up to 30 million children across the U.S.
- When schools are closed, kids lose access to these healthy meals and are at:
 - o Higher risk of food and nutrition insecurity
 - o More likely to experience obesity, poor grades, and other negative outcomes.
- O Despite best efforts, **group summer meal sites historically only reach 1 in 6 children** who are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals during the school year
 - o Leads to a meal gap during the summer months





SUN Bucks (Summer EBT)

Starting last year in summer 2024, a new permanent program, Sun Bucks, began to help bridge the hunger gap for children on break from school. Eligible children received \$40 per summer month (\$120 total), per child in the family.

- Researchers found that a similar program during the pandemic, Pandemic-EBT (P-EBT), reduced hardship among the lowest-income children by 30 percent in the week after families received benefits.
- P-EBT protected an *estimated 2.7 to 3.9 million* children from hunger.
- Sun Bucks (Summer EBT) is <u>returning this year</u> and is expected to positively impact *more than 29 million* children across the nation.








SUN Bucks - Facts

- SUN Bucks benefits can be used wherever CalFresh is accepted.
 - oThis includes most local grocery stores, delivery via Instacart, and at participating farmer's markets.
- SUN Bucks benefits can be used to purchase SNAP EBT-eligible items:
 - oFruits
 - ○*Vegetables*
 - \circ Meat
 - *○Seafood*
 - ○*Veggies*
 - oEtc.
- Immigration status does NOT affect eligibility.
 - OIn addition, using SUN Bucks benefits will not affect immigration status.








<u>Automatic Certification</u> – Families will automatically get mailed the SUN Bucks card for their eligible child.

- Children receiving CalFresh or CalWORKS.
 - This includes children whose families are currently on the program or who were on these programs at any point during the school year.
- Children who are considered:
 - Foster
 - Homeless
 - Migrant
 - Runaway




Automatic Certification

- Children enrolled in a school, pre-school, or Head Start program that participates in NSLP/SBP (national school lunch/school breakfast program) & are certified for free & reduced-priced meals
 - Note that school meals are FREE for all children, BUT families must check with their school to see if they are certified.
 - Families may have fill out a Free/Reduced Price Meal Form if they haven't already.

^{*}note: eligibility flowchart also available in Spanish!







Other potential eligibility

- children not enrolled in these programs & attending CEP/Provision Schools 1, 2, or 3 need parents to opt in by filling out the Universal Benefits Application (UBA).
- Children whose families are enrolled in Medi-Cal may need to opt in by filling out the <u>Universal</u> Benefits Application (UBA).
- The **UBA form** is available at their school.
 - Deadline to apply September 1st, 2025

<u>Note:</u> CEP/Provision Schools (non-pricing meal service option for schools and school districts in low-income areas).



SUN Bucks Eligibility

- Families should update their address with their school & the county:
 - Depending on eligibility, cards will be automatically sent to the address on file with the school/county.
 - You can contact the county by calling ACCESS (866) 262-9881 or visiting your local county office.
- SUN Bucks Benefits will not be eligible for replacement due to EBT skimming/scamming:
 - However, benefits will be eligible for replacement due to disaster or household misfortune.
- SUN Bucks Benefits must be used within 122 days:
 - If families receive both CalFresh & SUN Bucks, we recommend using SUN Bucks FIRST we recommend using the benefits within 3 months.







Lessons from 2024's administration of the program:

- 100,000 children in the state of CA did not activate their benefits
 - o Remember \$120 per card!
- Overall, there was only a 76.7% PIN rate (percentage of eligible families who activated their SUN Bucks card)
 - o Around 1.3 million children overall who did not access their benefits
 - o This does not include the # families who were eligible but never applied

Creating a Hunger Free San Diego requires more outreach about the program – informing families about their eligibility, how to activate benefits, and who to connect with for questions.


Children whose families are on CalFresh are automatically eligible for SUN Bucks!



CalFresh – Community Partners

Students whose families are on CF are automatically eligible for SUN Bucks!

Why is CalFresh Outreach is Important for Students?

When kids are enrolled in CalFresh, they get the food they need to succeed both at home and school. But many newly eligible families may not know they qualify or how to sign up.

CalFresh helps kids at home:

Now is a great time to apply to CalFresh! A family of four can now receive up to \$975 a month to purchase food.

*CalFresh benefit allotments amounts can vary on a month to month basis, based on income.

CalFresh helps kids at school:

Students enrolled in CalFresh are directly certified for free school meals and SUN Bucks (Summer EBT). Learn more about SUN Bucks in the next page.

Please Note: Immigrant families may be hesitant to enroll in CalFresh, but it is currently safe for families to access.

CalFresh helps kids in the classroom: When students consistently get the food they need, it leads to lower rates of chronic absenteeism, stronger test scores and fewer disruptions caused by behavior or trips to the nurse.

CalFresh Outreach is Important for Schools

CalFresh helps school nutrition budgets: Students enrolled in CalFresh are automatically certified for free school meals. That means fewer school meal applications to process and fewer unpaid meal charges.

CalFresh helps schools qualify for more programs: When more eligible students get enrolled in CalFresh, it improves a school's ability to operate free summer and afterschool meal programs and to adopt the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), which enables eligible schools to serve meals to all students at no cost to families. In order to participate in CEP, schools must have Identified Student Percentage (ISP) over 25 percent, which includes students on CalFresh. Learn more about CEP here.
















Food Assistance is **NOT** a Public Charge

Public Charge: Public charge is a federal test for green card and visa applicants to determine if they rely on government cash assistance. Under the Biden administration's 2022 update, CalFresh, WIC, and other non-cash benefits do not affect immigration applications, and eligible families can safely access health, nutrition, and housing programs without public charge concerns.

Programs like CalFresh (SNAP), WIC, and other non-cash federal assistance do <u>NOT</u> affect immigration applications:



- School Meals
- WIC
- Food pantries
- Food distributions

- Meals for Older Adults
- Older Adult Commodity and Emergency Food Assistance Boxes (CSFP & TEFAP)
- CalFresh






COVID-19, INFLUENZA, & RSV POSITIVITY







