Introduction

This promotion toolkit is designed for community organizations and service providers within San Diego County. Through this toolkit, we collectively seek to:

- raise awareness about kinship families,
- reach new kinship caregivers, and
- educate the community about the resources, services, and support available to the families.

This toolkit was created by a group working to "Bridge Systems for Kinship Families" in San Diego County. The group includes kinship caregivers, representatives of multiple County agencies and community-based organizations, and staff and partners of the Grandfamilies & Kinship Support Network, the only federally supported national technical assistance center on the families.

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Script for Talking with Kinship Caregivers



Are you a kinship caregiver?

If you're raising a grandchild, niece/nephew, sibling, cousin, godchild, neighbor, friend's child, friend of your child, or child you taught or coached, you're a kinship caregiver.

Your kinship family is not alone. There are thousands of kinship families in San Diego County and many agencies and organizations that want to help support you and the children you are raising.

Script for Talking with Professionals and the Broader Community

Thousands of kinship caregivers raise grandchildren, other relatives, and close family friends throughout San Diego County.

They've stepped into this role because the parents are no longer able to raise the children. The parents may have died, or they may be unable to parent because they have substance use disorder, are in prison, have been deployed in the military, or were deported or detained. The circumstances that lead to the formation of kinship families can happen to any family, regardless of age, race, wealth, or education.

Unlike parents - who have automatic legal rights and responsibilities for their children - kinship caregivers do not. They have stepped up to raise the children, often at a moment's notice and during a crisis. As of that moment, they need authority to make decisions for the child, like enrolling them in school, and often need a court to grant a legal relationship - all of which takes time and money. Even with a legal relationship, the practical issues can be overwhelming. Like - where will the child sleep?


Despite these challenges, decades of research prove that children thrive with loving kin. Kinship caregivers keep children connected to their culture, identity, and family.

Help us spread the word about kinship families and services available in San Diego County to help them thrive.



Road Map

KINSHIP ROAD MAP

Are you raising your grandchild, another family member's child, or a close family friend's child? This roadmap will guide you step by step through this new journey. Check the back for resources to help you along the way.

Establish Care

If possible, work with the child's parents to get important information and documents. You will need the child's Social Security number. Get a "power of attorney" signed by the parents that spells out your role. If the parents are absent, complete a "caregiver's authorization affidavit."

* If the child was placed with you by the County's Child and Family Well Being Department (CFWB), work with your case worker. They can help you get Resource Family Approval to care for your kinship child.

Address Basic Needs

Schedule health checkups, enroll the child in school, and connect with community resources. Consider applying for benefits such as Medi-Cal, CalFresh, WIC, CalWORKS child-only or family grants, and childcare subsidies.

If the child was placed with you by CFWB, work with your caseworker on the child's health and education needs. Your caseworker can help you get resources such as foster care payments, child care, and more.

Secure Other Support

Consider joining a caregiver support group for advice and emotional help. If needed for the child, get counseling and/or help for developmental needs.

 If the child was placed with you by CFWB, your case worker can help connect you to services for you and the child.

Consider Permanent Legal Options

Consider options, like adoption or guardianship, for creating a legally permanent family.

* If the child was placed with you by CFWB and can't go back to their parents, think about adoption or guardianship. These are your legal options for leaving foster care with the child. Adoption assistance and KinGAP are possible financial supports for those leaving foster care.
