





COVID-19 & INFLUENZA VACCINATIONS









IMMUNIZATION RECOMMENDATIONS





- AB 144, signed on 9/17/25, establishes CDPH as the source for immunization recommendations and preventive services guidelines for state program
- Sets Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommendations as baseline recommendations, which CDPH can then update based on guidance from professional organizations such as:
 - American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP)
 - American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP)
 - American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG)

Adults	All 65 years and older All younger than 65 years with risk factors All who are in close contact with others with risk factors All who choose protection	• All	All 75 years and older All 50-74 years with risk factors

- 1. COVID-19 vaccine is available for persons 6 months and older.
- 2. Protect infants with either prenatal RSV vaccine or infant dose of nirsevimab or clesrovimab.



Preparing a Personal Emergency Kit

- Water
- Food
- Flashlight
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Batteries
- First aid kit
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items
- Multi-purpose tool
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cell phone with chargers
- Emergency blanket
- Map(s) of the area







Preparing a Pet Emergency Kit

- 3+ days supply of food and water with bowls
- Two weeks of your pet's medications
- Litter boxes with litter, if you have cats
- Plastic bags for poop, if you have dogs
- Crates, bedding, and toys
- Extra leashes and collars
- Vaccination and medical records
- Photos and description of your pets
- Pet tag with info on intended destination
- Grooming Items























How to be a Animal Safety C.H.A.M.P.



Plan Ahead (C.H.A.M.P.)

- Create an evacuation plan
 - List of motels/hotels that are pet friendly
 - List of your local vets and shelters
- Have an emergency phone list ready in case you're away
- Assemble a folder with your pets documentation, including owner contact info, medical and vaccination records, photos, and feeding schedule
- Microchip and include identification on your pet
- Participate in evacuation drills
 - Practice Transporting Your Pet







Alerts and Warning









- Download <u>SDSU Safe App</u>.
- Confirm your mobile device can receive Wireless Emergency Alerts.
- Sign up for text and/or email alerts from <u>AlertSanDiego</u>.
- Genasys Protect
- Shake Alert
- Consider purchasing a NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards.
- Travel alert and warning.








Building and Area Evacuations

- Know your available exits
- Engage your senses
- Drills vs. Reality
- Communicating with first responders & 911

- Severe Weather
- Hazmat Incidents
- Active Assailant

Access and Functional Needs (AFN)

- Consider the following: Blind/Low Vision; Deaf or Hard Hearing; and Mobility Issues
- Ask if the person wants your help, and how you may best assist them.
- If someone refuses your help, advise first responders as soon as safely possible.
- Do not touch the person, their service animal, or equipment without their permission.
- Do not try to move someone unless you are trained in proper techniques.

Know Your Tools. Stay Informed. Stay Safe.

AlertSanDiego

The County's emergency alert system

- People can sign up with their home address and contact information to get alerts for their area.
- It sends important information during local emergencies by phone call, text message, or email.
- The system gives quick and clear updates about evacuations, dangers, and other safety concerns.



Genasys Protect

Is a free app that helps keep people stay safe during emergencies.

- It shows real-time maps with evacuation zones, shelters, and other important safety areas.
- Anyone can use it, even without signing up.
- The app shares verified updates directly from emergency personnel, so you know the information is trusted and accurate.

SD Emergency App

Is a free tool that helps you prepare for and stay safe during disasters.

- It has emergency plans, checklists, and guides to help you and your family get ready.
- The app sends push alerts during major incidents in San Diego County.
- All information comes from official emergency personnel, so you can trust the updates.





Operationalize Your Community Network

- Evaluate services, resources, and capacity to support your community
- Connect with other organizations in your region and build your community network
- Connect with your local and regional preparedness departments and organizations
- Coordinate disaster preparedness education efforts in your community
