

FAQs

What is the Take Me Home Program?

The registry gives law enforcement quick access to critical information about a registered person with disabilities in case of an emergency.

Who is eligible?

All members of the community with a cognitive impairment or disability that may affect their ability to communicate.

What should I do if my loved one goes missing?

Call 911 immediately and explain that your loved one has dementia or another disability. If they are enrolled in Take Me Home, be sure to let the dispatcher know that as well.

How will this help?


Information about their physical appearance, the most likely places they would go, as well as triggers and de-escalation techniques will be sent to all law enforcement in the area to look for the missing person.






ELECTRIC SCOOTER LAWS IN CALIFORNIA

Definition (CVC § 407.5)

An electric scooter is:

- A two-wheeled device
- Equipped with handlebars
- · A floorboard for standing
- · Powered by an electric motor
- electric scooters are not classified. as motorcycles or mopeds.

When a Scooter Might Be Reclassified

Your scooter may be considered a motor-driven cycle or e-motorcycle if it:

- Exceeds 15 mph
- Lacks a floorboard
- Has a seat and no pedals
- Resembles a moped or motorcycle in design


ABOUT FEASTER CHARTER SCHOOL

Our goal is to prepare them for college and career readiness within a global society. We achieve this through an integrated approach that combines the principles of STEAM education and language immersion in our instructional practices.














HFMD TIMELINE AT FEASTER CHARTER SCHOOL

Total cases: 94 students (as of Sept 16)

Symptoms: fever, rash on hands/feet/mouth, diarrhea/vomiting



August 18, 2025

INFECTION CONTROL MEASURES

Health Policies

Students return when rash/blisters have dried & feverfree for 24 hours Emphasis on hand washing No sharing of food or supplies

Cleaning & Disinfecting

Daily use of Clorox Hydrogen Peroxide wipes
Virex II/256 via sprayers in classrooms
Restrooms disinfected twice daily & Deep cleaning on
weekends



Student Schedules

Cafeteria closed - lunches delivered to classrooms
Classroom disinfecting by custodians 2x/day
Limited access to shared spaces

Tracking & Communication

Excel sheet for case tracking
Updates to parents & staff using 2-way
communication systems

Ventilation

MERV-8 filters in HVAC

Medify AiRx air purifiers in each classroom

Regular cleaning of vents



ASSESSMENT & KEY FINDINGS



Common

HFMD is common in children, especially in fall



Easily Spread

Illness is typically mild but spreads easily



Track, Communicate, Clean

Once a pattern is recognized, track, and share preventative measures with staff & families





Hygiene

Post handwashing/cough etiquette signage

Disinfect

Use district-approved disinfectants for better coverage against HFMD virus & use air purifier use with HEPA filters

Meal Time

Encourage outdoor meals & recess to reduce indoor exposure

Hand Washing

Ensure thorough handwashing after recess

Nurses' Office

Provide outdoor waiting space near nurse's office for sick students

SEASONAL INFLUENZA (FLU)







- Everyone 6 months and older should get a <u>flu</u> <u>vaccine</u> every year
- You can get flu vaccines at the same time as COVID-19, RSV, or other vaccines

IMMUNIZATION RECOMMENDATIONS





- AB 144, signed on 9/17/25, establishes CDPH as the source for immunization recommendations and preventive services guidelines for the state program
- In collaboration with the West Coast Health Alliance
- Beginning Jan 1 2025, CDPH will make vaccine recommendations based on guidance from professional organizations:
 - American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP)
 - American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP)
 - American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG)


Los Angeles child dies from rare measles complication years after recovery

- Subacute sclerosing panencephalitis (SSPE) is a rare, progressive brain disorder that can develop two to 10 years after a person's initial measles infection.
- About 1 in 10,000 people with measles later develop SSPE but among those who are infected as infants, the risk is around 1 in 600
