The Bottom Line

1. The County is **here to help** and is being proactive to help people maintain benefits.
2. **Most people will remain eligible** by qualifying for exemptions or meeting the requirements.
3. Top priorities for customers:
 - i. Ensure **contact information is updated**.
 - ii. Submit requested documentation timely.
4. Federal changes are significant. Resources are available to **share clear, consistent messaging** to the community.



H.R. 1 Background

H.R. 1

- On July 4, 2025, House Resolution 1 (H.R. 1), also known as the “One Big Beautiful Bill Act”, was signed into federal law.
- The bill includes changes to the CalFresh and Medi-Cal programs that California will need to implement over the upcoming years.

CalFresh 101

- California's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Monthly supplemental food benefit that depends on household size, income, etc.
- **Almost 400,000 people are enrolled in San Diego County**
 - 29% under 18 years old
 - 21% over 65



H.R. 1 Background



Two CalFresh changes California must implement in 2026:

- Changes to eligibility for some **non-citizens**
- Reimplementation of the **Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents** (ABAWDs) time limit



Medi-Cal 101

- California's Medicaid program for no-cost or low-cost health insurance
- **Around 800,000 people are enrolled in San Diego County**
 - ~300,000 ACA Expansion adults
 - 33% under 18 years old
 - 11% over the age of 65

H.R. 1 Background



Several Medi-Cal changes California must implement in 2026 and 2027:

- Changes to eligibility for some **non-citizens**
- **Work requirements**
- **Six-month eligibility**
- **Retroactive coverage** limitations

January 1, 2026	Full-scope Medi-Cal enrollment freeze for individuals with “Unsatisfactory Immigration Status” (UIS)	Applies to new applicants only
April 1, 2026	CalFresh non-citizen eligibility categories changed	13,000 customers
June 1, 2026	CalFresh Work Requirements will apply to “Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents” (ABAWD)	93,500 customers
October 1, 2026	Federal changes to immigration statuses , switching some non-citizens to State-funded, full scope Medi-Cal	43,000 customers

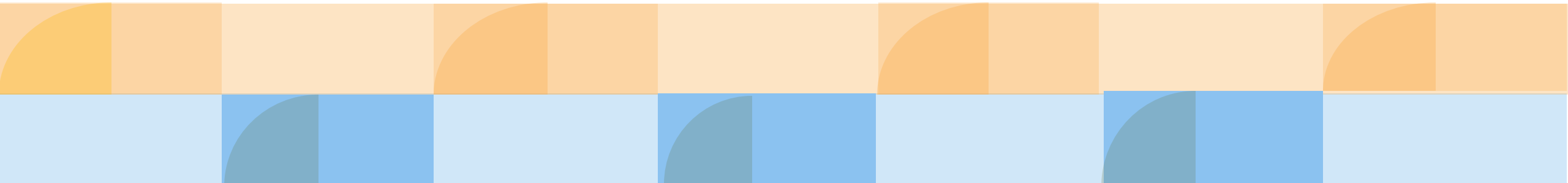
Timeline of Changes



Implementation Date	Policy Change	Estimated San Diego County Impact (as of May/June 2026)
2027		
January 1, 2027	Medi-Cal Work Requirements begin	310,000 customers
January 1, 2027	Medi-Cal six-month eligibility checks begin	130,000 households
January 1, 2027	Those affected by federal immigration status redefinitions switch to Fee-for-Service Medi-Cal	



CalFresh Changes



CalFresh Changes: Non-Citizens

APRIL 1, 2026

- Some non-citizens are no longer eligible to receive CalFresh benefits
 - **New CalFresh applications** received on or after April 1, 2026, will be reviewed using the new rules.
 - As of April 1, 2026, **households already receiving CalFresh** will be reviewed using the new rules at their next annual renewal.

CalFresh Changes: Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents (ABAWDs)

JUNE 1, 2026

- **Work requirements** began for some adults. unless they meet an exemption
 - **New applications** will be reviewed using the new rules
 - **Households already receiving CalFresh** will be reviewed using the new rules at their next annual renewal.
- Many **exemptions** exist, including:
 - Having child(ren) under 14 in the home
 - Physically or mentally unable to work

~93,500 Impacted

CalFresh Work Requirements



People who may need to meet work requirements include:

- Adults 18-64
- Do not have children under 14 at home
- Are physically and mentally able to work
- Do not meet any other [exemptions](#)

Can be met by completing 20 hours/week (80 hours/month) of:

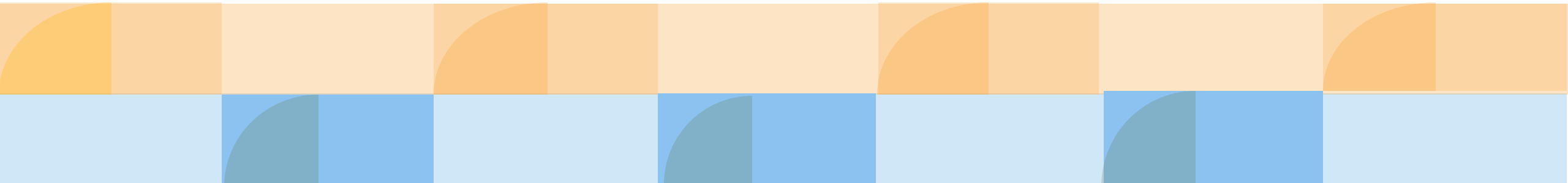

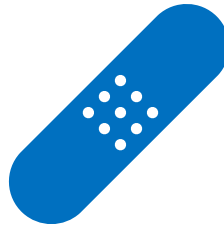


Medi-Cal Impact to San Diego County



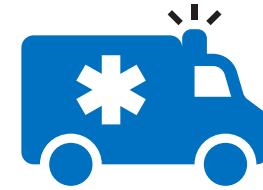
310,000

Medi-Cal Changes: Non-Citizens

January 1, 2026

- **Enrollment freeze** for adults with “Unsatisfactory Immigration Status” (UIS)

October 1, 2026

- Federal **changes to immigration statuses** go into effect, switching some non-citizens to State-funded, full scope Medi-Cal

January 1, 2027

- Grandfathered undocumented individuals and those affected by immigration status redefinitions **switch to Fee-for-Service** Medi-Cal

~67,000 IMPACTED

Who Will Still Be Eligible for Medi-Cal?

From **October 1, 2026**, customers **remain eligible** for federally-funded, full scope Medi-Cal if they are one of the following:

Medi-Cal Changes for Certain Groups

Starting **October 1, 2026**, these groups transition to State-funded, full-scope benefits, then Fee-for-Service **January 1, 2027**:

Asylee	Refugee	Parolee (unless CHE)	Individual with deportation or removal withheld
Conditional entrant	Victim of trafficking	Battered non- citizen	Iraqis and Afghans with Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs)
	Some Afghan nationals granted parole July 31, 2021 - Sept 30, 2023	Some Ukrainian nationals granted parole Feb 24, 2022 - Sept 30, 2024	

Medi-Cal Changes

January 1, 2027

- **Work requirements** begin for some 19–64-year-olds
- **Six-month eligibility** checks will begin for some adults
- **Retroactive coverage** limited from 3 months prior to application to 1 or 2 months

~310,000 IMPACTED

Medi-Cal Work Requirements

People who may need to meet new requirements:

- Adults 19-64 years old without dependents
- Has Medi-Cal due to ACA expansion
- Do not have an exemption



Can be met by completing 20 hours/week (or 80 hours/month) of:

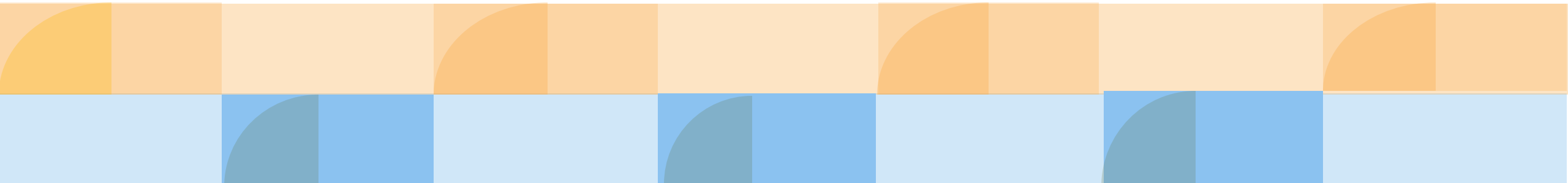

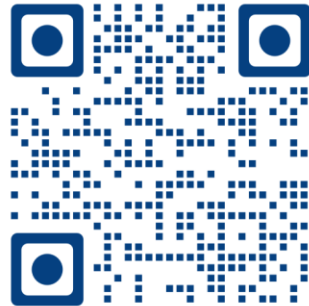
